## Formerly Incarcerated FAQ

Situation	Answer
I have a criminal record, can I vote in MN?	Your criminal record does <b>not</b> affect your right to vote in Minnesota <b>unless</b> you are currently serving a felony conviction sentence, including probation, parole, or supervised release.
I have a felony conviction. How do I vote?	You can vote after you have finished all parts of your sentence. This includes any probation, parole, or supervised release. As soon as you finish fulfilling your sentence (once you are 'off-paper'), you will need to register to vote. This can be done <a href="#">here</a> .
You <b>CAN</b> vote if..	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- You were charged with or convicted of a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor.</li> <li>- You are in jail but are not currently serving a felony sentence.</li> <li>- You have been charged with a felony, but you haven't been convicted.</li> <li>- You have been given a stay of adjudication.</li> <li>- You finished all parts of your felony sentence.</li> </ul>
You <b>CAN NOT</b> vote if...	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- You are currently serving a felony sentence.</li> <li>- Your stay of adjudication was revoked and you are currently serving a felony sentence.</li> </ul>
I am unsure of my legal status.	Seek legal advice from an attorney for clarity.
