Know Your Rights FAQ

As a voter in Minnesota, you have many rights—get to know them!

Your Rights	More Information
Taking time off work to vote.	You have a right to take time off of work to vote without losing your pay, personal leave, or vacation time.
Voting if you are in line by 8pm.	You have the right to vote if you are in line to vote anytime before 8 p.m.
Registering on Election Day.	You have the right to register to vote on Election Day if you can show the required proof of residence.
Signing in orally.	You have the right to orally confirm who you are and to ask another person to sign for you if you cannot sign your name.
Asking for help.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - You have the right to ask anyone for help, except for an agent of your employer or union. - A voter who requires assistance in marking a ballot, by reason of blindness, disability, or inability to read or write, may be given assistance to do so by a person of the voter's choice, other than the employer or agent of that employer or officer or agent of the voter's union. - Read this statement in other languages
Bringing children to the polls.	You have the right to bring your children with you to vote.
Voting after you've served a felony conviction.	You can vote after you finish all parts of your felony conviction sentence, including any probation, parole, or other conditions such as restitution.
Voting if you're under guardianship.	You have the right to vote if you are under a guardianship, unless a judge has revoked your right to vote.

Voting without being influenced.	You have the right to vote without anyone in the polling place trying to influence your vote.
Getting a replacement ballot.	You have the right to a replacement ballot if you make a mistake on your ballot before you cast it.
Filing a complaint.	You have the right to file a written complaint at your polling place if you are unhappy with the way an election is being run.
Bringing a sample ballot.	You have the right to take a sample ballot into the voting booth
Bringing the Voter's Bill of Rights.	You have the right to take a copy of the Voter's Bill of Rights (Minnesota Statutes 204C.08, subd. 1d) into the voting booth.
